

## IRLS 558 Social Justice and Information Services

### Course Description:

Library and Information Science often works within an individualistic paradigm. It assumes that individuals are the ones who possess knowledge and who have information rights such as privacy, intellectual freedom, and intellectual property. There are, however, serious limitations to this individualistic paradigm, especially with regard to members of marginalized social groups, such as those defined by gender, (dis)ability, ethnicity, sexual orientation or status, age, race, or class.

In this course, we will explore the ways in which membership in such groups is related to unique forms of knowing and information needs. Particular attention will be given to the ways in which libraries and other information services can be designed so as to foster the development and preservation of group knowledge and respect for information rights of such groups and their members. We will also consider the broader implications of group information rights for policy and law.

### Course Objectives:

- Different forms of knowing, including culturally based ways of knowing.
- Diverse ethical perspectives and their role in designing a professional ethic.
- Human rights related to information access, privacy, and intellectual property (with special attention to diverse user groups).
- The unique information needs of various groups and their members and the rights that these needs create,
- The rights of groups and their members to have a say in the creation and dissemination of information by and about them.
- The rights of groups and their members to accessible and relevant information.
